### **Subject: Peace Country Food Fest 2001**

On behalf of the Peace Value Added Food and Ag Association and the Food Fest 2001 committee, I would like to thank the Peace River Agriculture Development Fund committee for their commitment and generous financial contribution to *Peace Country Food Fest 2001*.

As a trade show and exhibition, this initiative of the Peace Value Added Food and Ag Association targets all aspects of the Peace Region food industry. Thanks to the many supporters of this event, including the Peace River Agriculture Development Fund, the size, scope and impact of Food Fest 2001 far exceeded our expectations. The event excitement was electrifying with 31 trade show booths filling the hall with tantalizing smells and fabulous products. The over 675 consumers, industry buyers and foodservice representatives attending the show had plenty of delectable Peace product selections to choose from - high tea to herbal wraps; fresh pasta to juice.

The Great Token Race was a popular contest with the attending public. By giving their red token to their favourite booth, each customer registered their vote for the "Best Booth at Food Fest 2001". The booth with the most red tokens in each category took the prize: an ad in Grande Prairie's Daily Herald Tribune newspaper and a free booth in next year's Food Fest. The honours went to Briggswood County Preserves for best producer booth, Gourmade for best restaurant and Save-On Foods for best business booth.

The Culinary Challenge continued to be a favourite of the foodservice industry. As part of Food Fest 2001, it hosted 53 participants in 3 categories: Student (5 teams of 4), Professional (9 teams of 2) and Community (5 teams of 3). Attracting entrants from around the Peace including Grande Prairie, Dawson Creek, Sexsmith, Beaverlodge and Albright, as well as Edmonton and Calgary, the response to this opportunity was overwhelming. Presentation was held at 4 pm at the trade show with an annual trophy plus medal, cash or merchandise prizes going to the winners in three categories. The awards were given out on a point system. Winners display the large trophy in their business for one year and receive a smaller trophy to keep. The black box format continued in the competition this year, allowing Peace Country products to be showcased to the foodservice industry and public.

By bringing Peace country producers and processors together with chefs, culinary students, foodservice operators and consumers, Food Fest 2001 was successful in promoting "Peace Country Products"

#### **Project Successes . . .**

- ◆ The \$5,000 from the Peace River Agriculture Development Fund provided us with financial leverage to show our commitment to the project and confirm other sponsors.
- ◆ \$29,000 in community, business and regional sponsorship was received. Sponsorship dollars in combination with the \$5,000 Peace River Agriculture Development Fund contribution allowed us to target a specific program initiative to meet the market development needs of Peace producers and food processors.
- ◆ Project partners worked as a team. We were able to build on each other's strengths and work together to achieve results quickly and effectively. As a result, a huge, integrated, comprehensive and effective program was implemented in a short time period. Without a co-operative environment, we could not have achieved what we did.
- ◆ The project attracted interest from producers and processors as well as from the foodservice industry across the Peace region.

## Community Reflections

### The Mystery of St. Emile's Mission and Cemetery

If you go down to the woods today you're sure to find a surprise. Monday, September 24th saw seven people drive approx. 8 kilometres east on highway 49 to Stan and Glenda Keith's land on the banks of the Peace River. This was no ordinary trip to the country, for situated in the centre of this field is a group of trees with a secret. Thirty to

fifty graves sit lonely, undisturbed or tended. A few headstones peek out among overgrown caragana bushes and tall grass.

A mission once occupied this location but now all that remains is a cement staircase leading into the foundation still intact except for the poplar trees which have manipulated their way here and there through the concrete. Further into the trees evidence shows another building once stood.

Cutting our way through more underbrush we came upon the resting place of Melania Dewetter 1857 - 1916. At one time a beautiful picket fence surrounded her. The fence is still standing although in dire need of restoration of which we are hoping to undertake.

What we know to be fact - St. Emile's was built by Fathers Hautain and Croise in 1915. The Church was blessed on May 28, 1916 by Bishop Emile Grouard. Burials were

conducted from 1916 - 1932. Some of the interned are Decosse, Gay, Hibert, Levasseur, McDonald, Mahoun, Marton, McDowell, Michaud, Miskamuk, Proulx, Ricard, Walter and Mr. Fried Seymour who died in 1921 from appendix rupture while being taken to Grande Prairie by wagon.

This mystery is too great for us to solve alone. Scractel your head and think deeply in case a piece of the puzzle, any

piece, is stored in the back of your mind. Did you once drive by it? Did anyone ever say the name or have a picture? HELP!

Previous articles about the Pioneer Cemetery has resulted in many phone calls and the placing of headstones on 5 graves by existing family members. Information was also obtained on Mr. Quick (1924) whose headstone was found in the Public Works yard in Pouce and Mr. Baxter whose

stone has been hiding in the Legion for 50 or so years. These will be put in their proper location come spring. Requests have also come in from families wanting to know if we can find the final resting place of loved ones.
